Vital For The Future: Safety Tax Gets Public Meeting On March 26

On April 2, Clinton voters will have the opportunity to vote for a Public Safety Tax of one-half cent on the ballot. Approval of the tax will enable Clinton's Fire and Police Departments to increase citizen safety with an increase in firemen and police road officers on each shift. It will also provide a more competitive pay salary for retention and recruiting purposes and will allow emergency funds for miscellaneous needs.

Clinton City Council members will host a Public Safety Tax Informational Meeting to discuss the issue and provide information on Tuesday, March 26, in the Cummings Room at the Benson Center. It begins at 6 P.M. Attending the meeting to help answer questions will be Fire Chief Mark Manuel, Assistant Fire Chief Matt Willings, Police Chief Kevin Miller and Deputy Chiefs Captain John Scott and Captain Paul Abbot.

"The Police and Fire Department personnel have asked the City Council for additional personnel, but the city has not been allowed by statute to put a Public Safety Tax on the ballot until now," said Clinton Mayor Carla Moberly. "Senate Bill 186, signed by Governor Parson in July

2023, authorizes the city to put a public safety tax question to a vote.

Mayor Moberly said that in 2017 the city approved a one-quarter percent fire protection tax, but it could only be used for the purchase of fire trucks, vehicles, and the addition of an assistant fire chief.

Fire Chief Mark Manuel said that his department is looking to hire six new firefighters. He said that

there are currently four on each shift, and they can supplement sometimes with volunteer firefighters, but they usually have other jobs and are not always available.

"Now we have two on the truck and two fighting fires during a fire call," said Chief Manuel. "But, when personnel are off for vacations or illness, it can result in a shortage that could put our firefighters in harm's way as well as the citizens that we are protecting. We can't perform to the best of our ability."

Chief Manuel said that recently a man got stuck in a grain bin up to his chest with more grain falling on him. It took nine firefighters to rescue him, and that was because it happened during a shift change and both shifts were available. Normally there would have

Crossroads Of Opportunity For Windsor With Rock Island Trail

People come from all over

the world to ride the 240 miles of the KATY Trail, the longest continuous rails-totrails recreational trail in the United States. When the next 144 miles

of the Rock Island Trail is completed and is connected to the KATY trail at its eastern end, the loop will become the longest railsto-trails route in the world. Both the Rock Island Trail and the KATY Trail are state parks, and both go right through the town of Wind-

Kim Henderson, owner of Kim's Cabins in Windsor, gave an update of the development of the Rock Island Trail at the March 10 meeting of the Windsor Historical Society. Her mes-

the KATY or the next 144 miles of the Rock Island." As vice-president of the Friends of Missouri Rock Island State Park, Kim spoke last June at the official opening of the first 47-mile section of Rock Island Trail State Park, a recreational corridor for walking, biking and non-motorized transportation, which starts at

Pleasant Hill and goes to Windsor, with trailheads in Medford, Chilhowee and Leeton. The ceremony was held in Windsor, where the KATY Trail passes over the Rock Island Trail on a bridge, near the Windsor High School.

The next 144 miles of the railroad trail corridor, is not yet developed or open to the public. But in 2022, Kim attended a signing ceremony in Eldon, where Missouri State Parks officially accepted ownership of the former Rock Island Line track bed that spans mid-Missouri, going through Henry County to Ionia and Cole Camp in Benton County, then Sto-Rock Island Page 9

him. Chief Manuel said that the level of staffing in the department has not changed since 1975 when the department had about 250 calls a year. Last year they responded to 1500 calls. These calls included fires, car accidents, medical incidents, inspections on local businesses and other matters. He discussed the fire protection tax of 2017 saving that all that money was spoken for and is used to maintain and upgrading the fleet.

"We are not sitting idle when not on calls," said Chief Manuel. "We are busy all day doing a lot of public education in schools, teaching businesses how to use fire extinguishers, and training for weather safety and awareness. When we are on duty and not responding to a call we are doing our own training. We spend about two days a month training on top of our regular schedule."

Captain John Scott, one of two Deputy Police Chiefs in Clinton, said his department needs people and equipment.

"We are asking for four additional road officers, one for each of our four shifts," said Scott. "It doesn't take much to go from four down to two officers with time off for leave or illness. Two officers are the bare minimum, and an additional staff member would give us at least three. If there is a car wreck we can take care of it, but it is better with more officers. An extra person will mean better response time, more safety, and less overtime costs to cover absences."

Captain Scott said that if the Public Safety Tax passes, the income will be shared equally by the Fire and Police Departments. A pie graph depicting the percentage of new tax money going for specific needs in each department can be viewed on the Clinton Police Department Facebook page.

"A revised pay schedule is important to help our departments recruit and retain," said Scott. "Our starting pay is not comparable to surrounding communities. It used to be that a lot of people applied for jobs with our department, but that is no longer happening."

Captain Scott said that there were 944 calls to the Police Department in January 2024, or an average of over 30 calls a day, and some of those days 30 calls are being handled by only two road officers. He said that the number of calls increase in the summer and some of them take hours.

ver, Versailles and Barnett to Eldon, and crossing five more countries to Owensville, Gerald and Beaufort, south of Washington.

"We're at one end of a 450-mile loop," Kim said of Windsor.

Kim said Rock Island Trail supporters had hoped for a state grant to develop the recreational trail, but funding fell through. So the Rocky Island Trail is now progressing one section at time, Kim said, as towns along the trail get financing.

"Six communities have gotten grants," Kim said. 'The town of Gerald, south of Hermann, is expected to have the first mile of trail finished."

Gerald used local funding and donations, she said.

To connect the Rock Island Trail to Kansas City on the west end, Jackson County purchased and created a paved bicycle path that starts at the Chiefs stadium and goes through Raytown and Lee's Summit.

Raytown really benefited from the increased tourist traffic, Kim said.

"Crane Brewing suddenly became the place to be," she said of the brewery at 6515 Railroad St. "Local cyclists come for day rides, and people fly into Kansas City with their bicycles, unpack them and ride the trail."

There is one unfinished section between Lee's Summit and Pleasant Hill, but from Lee's Summit, the Jackson County section connects to the sports stadiums in Kansas City.

Cole Camp is two miles off of the route of the Rock Island Trail, Kim said, but the community has gotten a grant plus donated land to put up a trailhead. Once sections of the Rock Island Trail are developed through the communities, it will be a matter of connecting the dots, she said. Kim said her cabins are already booked for half the year, and not all the visitors are cyclists. People stay at Kim's Cabins who are in town for weddings, the birth of grandchildren and annual family reunions, Kim said. The cyclists say they enjoy the quiet, the farmland and the Amish.

The Rock Island Trail through Windsor now extends to Windsor's Farmington Park, which has a fishing lake, a half-moon bridge and a disc-golf course. In Central Missouri, the route of the Rock Island Trail goes through three tunnels and over two bridges, the most impressive being the 1,700 foot long Gasconade Bridge over the Gasconade River. One of Kim's visits to trail sites along the Rock Island included experiencing what it was like to walk on the old bridge.

"I was very hesitant to walk out of on it," she said. "I had to hold onto Ron's hand," referring to Ron Bentch, trail development coordinator.

Kim also got to go through one of the tunnels, and describes the features on the Rock Island Trail as "just amazing." Unlike the KATY Railroad, the Rock Island Line shipped produce and products, connecting more than 20 small historic railroad towns in Central Missouri. Plans call for the recreational trail to turn north and connect with the KATY. At the next meeting of the Windsor Historical Society, historian Glynna Morse will give a history of the Rock Island Railroad, which first arrived in Windsor 120 years ago. The train is gone, the coal is gone, and the shoe factory is gone, Kim said, but what Windsor has now is the trail and the economic opportunities to provide services for

cyclists. With bicycle tourism growing, people are seeing the potential of Windsor. Donavan and Kelly Thompson moved to Windsor and restored a shop front at 212 S. Main St., where they opened The Pour Poet, a coffee, tea, book and antiques shop. Donavan is now working on the space next door, which he is turning into the Restore It Shop, Kim said.

In another development, a couple opened a barbecue restaurant, with plans for a taproom.

Other Windsor Historical Society programs on the horizon: On May 11, Tom Colwell will give a program on Henry Avery, the first person of European ancestry to settle in Henry County. In June, Dorothy Warren will present a program on Windsor bowling alleys, particularly appropriate now that someone is starting to renovate Windsor

In July, Bob Colvin, a Jefferson City photographer, will present "Back Roads of Missouri and Beyond." The Windsor Shoe Factory annual reunion of employees and descendants is in August, starting with a luncheon at Windsor United Methodist Church.

The Rock Island Trail will not be completed quickly, Kim said, but it's coming. When she first moved to Windsor, where she worked at a bank and then the city administrator, she watched the dotted line on the map of the planned trail for 15 years. She put up her first cabin 10 years ago near the bridge where the KATY Trail crosses over the Rock Island Trail. At that time, Windsor's only lodging option was the motel, which could house 17

Kim put up three more cabins and in 2018, quit her full-time job. The cabins are booked for half of this year, she said. Due to family situations, Windsor lost two other lodging options, Fitzgerald's and the Porter House, but she's hoping more people will see the opportunity.

"I want people to see the big picture," Kim said. "We have a huge potential as the trail expands."

Kim noted that visitors eat at local restaurants, and buy groceries and gas. Judy's Kitchen and the Wagon Wheel are popular, and last Saturday, there wasn't a vacant table at the Sidetrack Cafe, the trainthemed restaurant at 800 W. Benton.

Kim thinks there's room for more lodging options and restaurants offering different cuisines in Windsor. She sees promoting the trails as a team effort of Windsor residents and the residents of all the towns along the recreational trails.

"I've heard that 40,000 people have biked the KATY Trail," she said. "I think there's been more than that."

This effective management of funds has allowed us to seek approval of an additional \$14 million in bonds to enhance safety and extend the life and functionality of district buildings and facilities. This bond issue will not increase the tax levy, only extend the current bond 20 years.

We believe Question 1, and other bond issues like it, are the most responsible way for the district to tackle large capital projects to ensure facilities are safe, maintained, and equipped properly for succeeding generations of students in our community. If not addressed now, many of the proposed bond projects (ie, building settlement issues at Clinton Middle School) could lead to bigger and more expensive projects down the road.

So, how does Question 2, the Zero-Tax Increase Levy Transfer, work? The district is seeking authorization from voters to make adjustments to the district's debt services and operating tax levies with the purpose of providing a more competitive compensation structure for teachers and staff. The proposal is a transfer of 15 cents from the debt service levy to the operating levy. This transfer of funds would simply decrease the debt service levy from \$.8168 to \$.6668 while increasing the operating levy from \$3.0511 to \$3.2011. Regardless of how one votes, the existing levv of \$3.8679 (debt service and operating levies combined) would remain unchanged.

One could compare this to transferring money between your personal checking and savings accounts. If you have \$100 in each account for a total of \$200, and transfer \$50 from your savings account

to your checking account, you still have the same \$200, it is just structured differently.

Fish Shack Shakes It Up With Year Two Changes



BIG PLANS ARE ON THE MENU at Frank's Fish Shack with a pavilion for outdoor dining this season. Terry and Angie Carey reopened the burgeoning eatery last weekend.

A 24 by 48-foot pavilion for covered seating. Live music on summer nights. Cold beer and fresh-fried catfish.

Along with southern-style sides and desserts, Frank's Fish Shack on Hwy. 7 S. will be even more of a draw for lovers of fish dinners like you used to find in the South.

Angie and Terry Carey opened Frank's Fish Shack a year ago on their property, naming it after

Terry's father, Frank Carey, an ardent fisherman of nearby Truman Lake.

The plan: to start a business that taps into their cooking skills and love of hosting fish fries for friends and family, and transition the couple into the next stage of their lives.

Franks' Fish Shack has been such a hit that since July, Terry, a bricklayer like his father, no longer has to commute to the Kansas City area to oversee construction sites.

"The Shack enabled us to afford him to retire," Angle said.

Terry is the official fish fryer, taking the fresh premium catfish, delivered every week from the Delta, coating it and frying it to perfection when it's ordered.

"The quality is what makes the difference in

the taste," Angie said.
Angie still works from

home, but as the weekend approaches, cooks up Cajun-inspired side dishes and southern desserts. She hasn't tired of making food, she said, but looks forward to planning what she's going to make to add to the menu.

"I come up with something different every week," she said.

She and Terry can't believe it's been a year since they opened last year at the end of March. They expected the endeavor to be successful, she said, but "not this successful." Last year's opening generated so much buzz that they sold out of Fish Shack T-shirts twice before they even opened.

A few weeks ago, the Careys took a spring break and were gone for close to two weeks, Angie said. But since they reopened, it's been "crazy busy."

"Last weekend we ran out of everything," Angie said. "Everybody was missing the Shack."

Angie said once they got the system down, everything ran smoothly. The best part was getting to know their regular customers on a first-name basis.

"We have not dealt with one angry person," Angie said. "Everybody has been very nice, and appreciative of us being here. It makes us want to do what we do even more."

The hardest part was figuring how much food to make, Angie said, so that they don't run out. They always sell out of the individual fruit pies, called crab pies or hand pies, which she and her daughter make.

"It doesn't matter how many I make, 50 or 100,"

Angie said. "We sell out every week."

Terry said that the hardest part for him is when there's a line of customers at the window and he's trying to get the orders out. The longest people have had to wait is 10 minutes, Angie said.

Now the Careys are waiting for the trestles to build the pavilion, Angie said, which they expect to arrive next week. The liquor license has been approved, she said, and will be signed off once skirting is added around the base of the Fish Shack. That will be done after the pavilion is finished, Angie said, in case the position of the trailer has to be adjusted.

"The majority of the tables will be under the pavilion," Angie said, "and we'll have sun shades on the sides which can be lowered to block wind and rain."

They've lined up five bands to play on a weekend night May through September. An Acoustic Jam Night is scheduled for the last Saturday in June 29, from 6 to 10 p.m., and will feature Emmit Rickey and Clay Clear.

In addition to summer jam fests, the Shack will participate in the "Dine and Donate" fundraiser on August 10 for the Henry County Memory Fund. On August 17, they will hold the second annual Frank's Birthday Bash. Terry's father, who was born in 1933, would have

been 91 this year,

"We lost him to Alzheimer's," Angie said.

The Shack is now open Fridays from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m, and noon to 6 p.m. on Saturdays. Starting in May, it will also be open for lunch on Sundays from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. The Shack did offer breakfast, but now Angie does brunch once a month.


"I make biscuits and gravy," she said. "I make 60 biscuits and usually sell out by 11 a.m."

She said they may also take their smaller trailer into town on Cruizin' to Clinton nights, which are on the second Saturday of the month from 4 to 7 p.m., starting in May, and sell fish tacos and hand pies on the Square.

On nights they have live music at Frank's, they will stay open until 10 p.m, she said.

Frank's Fish Shack is on their property next to their house on Hwy. 7 S., just west of Tightwad. The address is 932 SE Hwy., Clinton MO 64735. The Fish Shack is open if you see the flags in their driveway flying after you pass SE 901 Rd. There is a graveled drive with lots of parking and room to turn around RVs or boat trailers.





WHEN TO SPEAK

This morning while I was reading the account of Joseph of Arimathea asking for permission to bury Jesus' body, I thought---Where was Joseph when they condemned Jesus? Obviously, Joseph was a sympathizer, maybe even a believer in Jesus. He was also a member of the Sanhedrin. Where was he during the "trial" that condemned Jesus? Was he out of town? Did he sit quietly and not speak up? Would/could his words have turned a bitter tide?

Early in the 1990's our church, Swope Park Baptist in Kansas City, Missouri, purchased 130 acres of land in Southwest Kansas City to relocate. This property would give us better access and would be more centrally located to our membership. On the eastern side of that property there was an established community which we hoped would enlarge our ministry reach.

Quite by accident I learned of a community meeting of this group and dropped in to tell them of our plans. I anticipated a mild but warm welcome. Boy, was I surprised! The community did not want us. They immediately complained of increased traffic, housing shortages, and other undesirable issues. They believed the land we purchased to the west was park property and would never be developed.

Not expecting a hostile reception, I had come completely alone. For the next half-hour, I was subjected to serious "we don't want you" rhetoric from nearly one hundred misinformed homeowners. Finally, a man on the back row of the group stood and said, "Who determined we didn't want this church here? I think this is a good thing!" Suddenly the hostile tide turned. "Yeah, who said we didn't want this? Why are we fighting this man.?" It was a very welcome turning point in our church's plans.

My encounter with the community group was just the beginning of a long struggle lasting a decade. I will forever be in debt to the man who spoke up that night. To this day, I have no idea who he was. I seriously doubt he has any idea how much his words counted.

I have told you all this knowing that Christianity is under serious attack today. Some day in some place you could be tempted to sit quietly and do nothing to defend what we believe. You might reason, "My words will not matter." Do not be too sure. Your words could turn the tide.

MDC congratulates Chad Williams of Olathe, Kansas for catching a world record 164-pound, 13-ounce paddlefish. Williams was on his first snagging trip March 17 when he reeled in the fish at the Lake of the Ozarks.

Chad Williams snagged a monster 164-pound, 13-ounce paddlefish at Lake of the Ozarks. The 2024 paddlefish

snagging season is off to a great start after an angler reeled in a world record fish at the Lake of the Ozarks. The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) congratulates Chad Williams of Olathe, Kansas for snagging a 164-pound, 13-ounce paddlefish at the Lake of the Ozarks March 17. The fish not only breaks the previous state record of 140 pounds, but also the previous world record of 164 pounds.

"I was lucky enough to get invited to go out snagging with friends," Williams said. "I'd never been snagging before. Never seen a paddlefish – didn't even know what it was!"

Shortly into the snagging trip, Williams hooked into something massive.

"I was thinking I was extremely weak because it was taking so long to reel in. My body was aching," he recalled.

After the fish made it onto the boat, the group immediately knew it was a

record. They later met MDC Fisheries and Protection staff at Three Brothers Meat Company in Montreal to weigh the fish on a certified scale. This makes the second state record caught in 2024.

Williams said he and his wife kept some of the paddlefish meat and shared the rest with their fishing group. He plans to taxidermy the head.

"I'm honestly still processing this whole thing," he laughed. "Conservation Agent Tyler Brown was in disbelief it was my first time snagging. He said, 'You don't have to go out fishing ever again! Nothing can top this!' and he's probably right!"

Missouri state record fish are recognized in two categories: pole-and-line and alternative methods. Alternative methods include trotline, throwline, limb line, bank line, jug line, gig, bow, crossbow, underwater spearfishing, snagging, snaring, grabbing, or atlatl. 
